Council News

- The Township Budget was finalized and tax bills will be going out the first week of August. The Public Budget
 meeting was held prior to the Council meeting on July 11. Thank you to those that attended. There will be an
 informative pamphlet included with the 2022 Final Tax Notice showing the expense and revenue for the year.
 Please read this carefully and if you have further questions inquire at the office or send Council a letter/email to
 express your concerns.
- Bylaws regarding tax ratios, tax rates, and budget were all passed along with a bylaw delegating limited authority to the Clerk /Treasurer, if necessary, during a possible Lame Duck period. "Lame Duck" is a term that Council is referred to when it is determined that the new Council will have less than three quarters of the former Council returning. The determination of whether a Municipal Council is in a restricted position is pursuant to section 275 of the Municipal Act, 2001. There are two periods of time in which a Lame Duck Council may occur. The first being after Nomination Day (August 19th) and the second after Voting Day (October 24th). When a Lame Duck Council occurs the Municipal Act, 2001 prohibits council from making certain decisions in a municipal election year when certain conditions are met. The Clerk/Treasurer has been given authority to make these decisions if required. Examples would be hiring and firing or making large purchases not in the budget. The day to day running of the Township is not affected by this possibility. It will not be known until August 19 if there will be Lame Duck period. This is the final day to file nomination papers and at that point it will be possible to ascertain the variety of outcomes that could happen at election time.
- Reeve and Council continue to attend ongoing outside board meetings and other affiliated activities. Lakehead Regional Conservation Authority, Thunder Bay Social Services Board, Thunder Bay District Municipal Association and Thunder Bay District Health Unit are examples.
- Council meets once each month during July and August and the above associations also have less meetings or a break during summer. During this time, Council and Staff are working on revamping each department and the Committees which will return in the Autumn and Winter.
- Emergency Preparedness and Planning is taking place and a new Emergency Plan will be available at the end of the year.



Preserving farm fresh eggs ("water glassing") By Kathy McGowan

We have an abundance of eggs during the spring and summer months thanks to long daylight hours and happy, healthy hens. Now is the time to preserve dozens of eggs to last us throughout the winter when the hens take a well-deserved break and egg production is low.


I use only fresh, clean and unwashed eggs collected the same day. I find that collecting eggs regularly during the day and clean bedding in the nest boxes result in clean eggs. Eggs have a natural protective coating called the "bloom" that prevents bacteria from getting inside the shell and reduces moisture loss from inside the egg. This protection is needed as the embryo develops. If all goes well, in 21 days a chick is born.

I preserve eggs using a method commonly called "water glassing." Fresh-laid eggs are submerged in a water-lime solution. I use pickling lime (also called "food-grade lime"), and 3 and 6 quart food grade containers with lids. I choose these container sizes because even when they're full of eggs and water-lime solution, I can carefully lift and move them as needed.

I add eggs every day to a container until it's ¾ full, leaving at least 2 inches of headspace, and put a lid on the container. They are stored in cool (maximum 20°C) and dark areas in our house, such as a closet or basement. I carefully remove eggs as I need them, and wash the eggs with cool water before cooking them.

I'm still using up eight dozen water glassed eggs preserved from November 2021. Some of my fellow homesteader/food preservation friends tell me they've stored and consumed eggs this way for up to two years without any issues; it's important for their food security.

I find that the yolks are often runnier than fresh eggs, but other than that, there's no noticeable difference in taste and texture. In my experience, most of the shells crack when hard boiled in water. However, once peeled and cooled, water glassed hard boiled eggs have the same texture as fresh eggs; I can't tell the difference. Note: an egg that floats in water is probably bad and should not be consumed. I've been using water glassed eggs scrambled, fried, hard boiled and in baked goods for nine months. I'm aiming to water glass 20 dozen by the end of this year. A lofty, but doable goal!

Off-road Vehicle Safety and Rules

- Off-road vehicles (ORVs) are year-round utility and recreational vehicles that must be:
 - registered
 - display a licence plate
 - insured under a motor vehicle liability policy
- When riding on-road or off-road the driver of an ORV must carry and produce the registration permit or a true copy and proof of insurance for the ORV.
- When riding on-road or off-road, drivers and passengers must wear an approved motorcycle helmet, securely fastened under the chin with a chin strap.
- For on-road riding, a driver must:
 - be at least 16 years old
 - hold at least a valid G2 or M2 licence
 - wear a seat belt, where provided
 - travel at speeds less than the posted speed limit

- For on-road riding, a passenger on an ORV:
 - must be at least 8 years old
 - must wear a seat belt or use foot rests, when applicable
- When travelling along a road, your ORV must:
 - be driven in the same direction as traffic
 - travel on the shoulder (if the shoulder is unsafe or not wide enough, an ORV can be driven on the travelled portion of the road)
 - have headlights and tail lights on (mandatory at night and in bad weather)
- When driving your ORV on trails, private property or Crown land (government-owned land), ride in designated areas only. You may require a trail permit and must always have the land owner's permission.

Fire Department

A note from Chief Hole about summer burning:

Just a reminder of some of the rules that need to be followed if you are burning outside in the summer:

- Permits to burn need to be renewed annually but are good for the calendar year.
- Piles of brush, branches, wood or other organic material can not be bigger than 1.8 m (6 feet) wide and tall and must be 7.5m from surrounding bush or buildings.
- Piles cannot be ignited until 2 hours before sunset and must be extinguished by 2 hours after sunrise.
- Don't burn if its too windy.
- Be aware of how the smoke from your burn will affect your neighbors.
- Don't burn garbage in either piles or burn barrels.
- Camp fires for cooking or warmth do not require a permit and can be lit at anytime of the day.
- Camp fires for cooking or warmth must be less than 1m (3 feet) in diameter.
- ALL fires must be supervised at all times and have a water source to extinguish it.

News from the Lakehead Region Conservation Authority—Aug. 2022 Edition

Cyanobacteria (blue-green algae) is a microscopic plant-like organism that is naturally found within natural streams, rivers, and lakes. The organism thrives in warm, nutrient-rich (high in phosphorous and nitrogen) environments. Blooms occur when the populations rise rapidly, creating a large floating mass that can be bluish-green, brown, red, or yellow in color. Changes in cyanobacteria populations can be an excellent indicator of water quality.

The LRCA is taking progressive steps to further understand and analyze cyanobacteria within the conservation areas and the Lakehead Watershed. In July and August 2022, the LRCA will be conducting weekly testing to determine the absence or presence of cyanobacteria at Hazelwood Lake, Mission Island Marsh, Hurkett Cove, and Silver Harbour Conservation Areas. Testing sites were selected based on the frequency of visitor contact with open water. Baseline data will be collected to determine the type of algae and characterize the trends within the water bodies throughout the year. Positive test results that indicate an exceedance of algae guidelines will be reported to the Ministry of the Environment, Conservation, and Parks (MECP) and the Thunder Bay District Health Unit (TBDHU). Confirmed exceedances may result in a beach closure as directed by the MECP or TBDHU. Any swimming advisories or beach closures will be posted on the LRCA's website and social media platforms and signage will be displayed at the site.

We are in the height of busy season at our Conservation Areas, and we would like to remind all visitors of the \$5.00 per vehicle fee. Better yet, purchase an Explore Card Parking Pass for \$40.00 +HST and forgo the parking fee altogether for a calendar year! If you visit Conservation Areas more than eight times in a season, the pass pays for itself. Explore Cards (as well as online payment of parking fees) can be purchased at store.lakeheadca.com.





Let's Go on a Nature Walk...

Featuring the Honeybee

- There are 3 kinds of bees in a hive: Queen, Worker, and Drone
- There is only one queen in a hive. She lays all the eggs and produces chemicals that guide the other bees behaviour
- Worker bees are all female and they do all the work inside and outside the hive including feeding baby bees, building the honeycomb, and gathering nectar and pollen from flowers
- Drone bees are male bees and their purpose is to mate with the new queen
- Honeybees can fly 25 km/h and their wings beat up to 200 times per second
- Honey comes in different colours and flavours. The flower where the nectar was gathered from determines the flavour and colour of the honey
- Fun Fact! During a worker bees life (about 6 weeks) she'll produce about a twelfth teaspoon of honey

Honeybee mortality rates this winter were the worst in years in Ontario with some beekeepers losing over 90% of their colonies. How can you help?

• Plant a pollinator garden

- Build a bee bath
- Avoid using chemicals on your gardens and lawns

Build a Bee Bath

Did you know that bees need water? They use it in many ways including to dilute honey, help with digestion, cool the hive, and make food for baby bees.

Supplies:

- Terra cotta planter
- Terra cotta saucer (or another shallow ceramic or glass dish)
- Rocks (smooth rocks work best)
- Water
- 1) Place the planter upside down in a shady spot
- 2) Place the saucer right side up on top of the planter
- 3) Put rocks in the saucer
- 4) Pour water into the saucer but keep the top of the rocks out of the water
- 5) Replace the water daily and clean the saucer weekly
- 6) Optional: paint the terra cotta pot (not the saucer) to add some more colour to your garden!
- *bees will sit on the rocks to drink the water so their wings don't get wet

Municipal Election Notice 2022



Municipal and School Board Elections occur every four years in Ontario and the legislation for the conduct of an election are set out in the Municipals Elections Act.

The next regular Municipal Election to elect (1) Reeve, (4) Councillors, and School Board Trustees is on October 24, 2022. The new term of Council begins November 15, 2022 and ends after the municipal election in 2026.

The nomination period for candidates opens on May 1, 2022 and nominations may be filed on any day on or after May 1 at a time when the Clerk's office is open and on Friday August 19, 2022 (Nomination Day) between 9:00 am and 2:00 pm.

To run for municipal office, you must be an eligible elector in the Township of Gillies.

An eligible elector on voting day is:

- A Canadian Citizen ;
- At least 18 years of age at the time you file nomination papers;
- Reside in the Township, or be the owner, or tenant of land in the Township, or the spouse of such owner or tenant; and
- Not prohibited from voting under any law.

Municipal Election Notice 2022



The Municipal Elections Act includes rules for third party advertising.

A third party advertisement is any ad that promotes, support or opposes a candidate in an election.

If a person, corporation or trade union intends to spend money between May 2, 2022, and election day on advertisements or other materials that support, promote, or oppose a candidate in the municipal election, or a question on the ballot, they are required to register as a third party advertiser with the Municipal Clerk.

The registration period for a third party advertiser for the 2022 Municipal Election will be between May 2, 2022 and October 21, 2022.

It is important to note that third party advertisers and candidates may not spend money on a campaign, accept contributions, or begin advertising until the Municipal Clerk certifies your registration.

Update of Standard of Care for Dogs Kept Outdoors 1-833-9-ANIMAL

Fact Sheet: Standards of Care for Dogs Kept Outdoors under the PAWS Act – Summary of Requirements (As of July 1, 2022)

Tethers:

Tethers must:



- · Permit 3 metres of horizontal movement
- Allow the dog to move about safely
- Be a size, type and weight that won't cause discomfort or injury
- Have a swivel at both ends
- Be in good condition and well-attached to prevent escape



Collars and harnesses used with a tether must be of a size, type, design and fit that won't cause discomfort or injury

When tethering a dog kept outdoors, an owner/custodian must not:

- (X) Use a choke, pinch, prong, slip, head halter or martingale collar
- Tether dogs under 6 months or that are in heat, whelping or nursing
- Cause undue distress, including because of the age, health or reproductive status of the dog or objects or hazards they can reach

Housing Pens:



Use of housing pens must not cause undue distress and housing pens must be constructed to prevent escape and provide protection from predators.

Housing pen minimum size must be scaled to the height of the dog (measured at shoulder):

• 1.5m² for each additional dog housed in the same pen (with exceptions)

Height (cm)	Area (m²)
70 or greater	15
>= 40 and < 70	10
>= 20 and < 40	6
less than 20	4

Aggressive dogs must not be housed together, and dogs in heat or coming into heat must not be housed with male dogs (with exceptions)

Housing Pen and Tether Area:



Must provide enough space for natural behaviours and distinct areas for feeding and drinking and defecating and urinating



Dog must not be forced to stand, sit or lie in feces urine, mud or water; area must be cleaned as needed to prevent the accumulation of waste; keep sanitary and minimize parasites

Additional Standards for Dogs Tethered Outdoors:



Dogs tethered outdoors for 23 hours in a 24-hour period, whether the 23 hours are consecutive or not, must be taken off the tether for at least 60 continuous minutes to allow for exercise and enrichment (with exceptions)

Note: the definition of "kept outdoors" does not apply to this

Fact Sheet: Standards of Care for Dogs Kept Outdoors under the PAWS Act – Summary of Requirements (As of July 1, 2022)

Shade, Shelter and Protection from the Elements:



Sufficient protection from the elements to prevent heat or cold-related distress, and shade as required by the weather, including to protect from direct sunlight



A dog shelter, available at all times, that:

- Is waterproof and provides protection from the elements
- Is structurally sound and does not cause injury
- Has an insulated roof, a level, elevated and dry floor, and is ventilated
- Has a doorway free from obstructions
- · Has bedding at least 3 inches thick, changed as needed to stay clean, dry, comfortable and unsoiled

Size of the shelter must allow all dogs using it to turn around, lie down with their legs extended and stand with their heads held at normal height



Livestock guardian dogs and dogs with access to a structurally sound building used to house livestock do not require a dog shelter



A dog "kept

outdoors" is a dog

that is outdoors for more than 60

minutes without its

owner or custodian

Food and Water:



Food that meets daily caloric requirements, is fit for consumption, not spoiled and does not contain dirt, feces, urine or toxic substances



Water at all times that is not frozen, does not contain dirt, feces, urine or toxic substances, and is replaced at least once every 24 hours

Food and water containers must be constructed to avoid injury and difficulty accessing food and water

Health and Grooming:



Daily health and welfare checks

Isolation from other healthy dogs if the dog is at high risk of or suffering from a contagious disease (with exceptions)

Dogs must not be kept outdoors if they have an injury or illness that affects their ability to regulate temperature or restricts mobility (with exceptions)



Grooming, as needed, of nails and to avoid matting of the dog's coat or accumulation of ice or mud on its coat or under its paws





Chief Animal Welfare Inspector

The *Provincial Animal Welfare Services Act, 2019* establishes a Chief Animal Welfare Inspector, as well as one or more Deputy Chief Animal Welfare Inspectors, appointed by the Solicitor General. The Chief Animal Welfare Inspector is responsible for:

- The appointment, oversight and handling of complaints about animal welfare inspectors; and
- The provision of necessaries and care to animals in their possession.

Provincial animal welfare inspectors are directly accountable to the Chief Animal Welfare inspector, who is in turn accountable to the Solicitor General. If you have a complaint or compliment about an inspector, please send an email to animalwelfareservices@ontario.ca.

Call **1-833-9-ANIMAL** if an animal is in distress or being neglected. This includes animals that are injured, in pain, sick, suffering or abused, or lack proper care, water, food or shelter.





