Seed Saving By Kathy McGowan

I started saving seeds years ago after attending a Seedy Saturday event at the Gillies Community Centre. I learned about Seeds of Diversity Canada, became a member and collected books about seed saving.

I also learned about the Bauta Family Initiative on Canadian Seed Security to build "a movement for resilient seed systems across Canada."

Since that Seedy Saturday, I've been learning and saving more and more seeds every year. I grow mostly non-GMO heirloom open-pollinated varieties suitable for our climate that are "true to type," meaning the offspring are similar to the parent plant. Since early September, I've been collecting seeds from various plants in our food forest and main garden to store inside during the winter. Although I'm still harvesting, planning for next year's gardens is already underway.

For me, the easiest seeds to save are coriander, milkweed, tomatoes, cucumbers, squash, corn, beans and peas. This year for the first time, I let more than a dozen Hollow Crown (heirloom) parsnip plants go to seed, and I've collected dozens of seeds to plant next summer.

Also this year, I started most squash, leek, cucumber, and tomato plants from seeds collected from last year's harvests. I'm thrilled that overall the plants are healthy and bountiful.

I like having my own seeds that are acclimated to our region, and enjoy being part of a worldwide movement of folks dedicated to self-sufficiency and resiliency. Growing varieties from the "days of yore" is a way of honouring the past and passing traditions along from generation to generation.

There's an active local group of growers. Superior Seed Producers, which sells quality seed with fantastic yields for our growing season. I have successful harvests thanks to the efforts of fellow seed savers sharing their skills and knowledge.



The Lakehead Region Conservation Authority has launched a new online web-based Mapping Tool to 'Map Your Property', as well as a new webpage 'Do I Need A Permit?' that includes an online Property Inquiry Form. The online tools will streamline the permitting and approvals process, improve client service, and provide user accessibility. Users can view property information, identify the approximate regulated areas, and create personalized maps that can be printed and saved. The Mapping Tool provides easy access to otherwise complex data and open access to information that the public can explore at their convenience. Along with the Property Inquiry Form, the online webbased tools offer increased efficiency, transparency, and speed of regulatory process and approvals.

The core mandate of Conservation Authorities is to undertake watershed-based programs to protect people and property from flooding and other natural hazards, and to conserve natural resources for economic, social and environmental benefits. The Lakehead Region Conservation Authority's new online tools supports the Government's commitment to achieve a streamlined approval process, while not jeopardizing the public's health and safety or the environment.

The 2023 Explore Card Parking Pass will be available for sale beginning November 1, 2022! Proceeds from the sale of Explore Cards contributes directly to the upkeep of our Conservation Areas; we rely on these funds now more than ever and appreciate the support. An Explore Card Parking Pass will provide parking for one calendar year at all of our seasonal and year-round Conservation Areas, allowing you to forgo the \$5.00 per vehicle day use parking fee. Thunder Bay District residents to be surveyed on public health needs

Over the next 12 months, residents of Thunder Bay and District communities will have an opportunity to voluntarily take part in a province-wide health surveillance system that, over time, will shed valuable light on the public health needs of local communities.

The Thunder Bay District Health Unit (TBDHU) encourages local residents to participate in the Rapid Risk Factor Surveillance System (RRFSS) if they are randomly selected. Staff from the project, which is led by York University's Institute for Social Research, will randomly call 100 people aged 18+ every month on behalf of the TBDHU. Calls will be made to landlines or cell phones. Responses will also be collected through an online survey starting in October.

The survey will ask about public health topics such as mental health, food access, and physical activity. It will take approximately 15 minutes to complete, is completely voluntary, and all responses remain anonymous and confidential.

The information gathered from these surveys will be used to influence decisions about local public health programming and can help raise community awareness about important public health issues. Surveying residents at this time will allow for comparisons to data collected pre-pandemic.

Many other Ontario public health agencies have used this efficient and valued system to help plan programs and services. Over time, summary information gathered can be shared with community partners to inform their programs and services, and will help inform local COVID-19 recovery efforts.



76% of farmers were classified as experiencing moderate or high perceived stress.

Avian Influenza: Preventing Transmission Animal Health Control Area Order



WHAT IS AVIAN INFLUENZA?

Avian influenza (AI) is a highly contagious viral disease that affects domestic and wild birds. Wild birds, especially waterfowl, are natural reservoirs of AI viruses.

SIGNS OF AVIAN INFLUENZA (H5N1):

- The earliest signs of infection in chickens are a loss of appetite and a decrease in egg production.
- Clinical signs: coughing and gasping for air, diarrhea, lack of energy, tremors or lack of coordination, swelling of the skin under the eyes, congestion of wattles and comb.
- Domestic poultry have no natural immunity and experience nearly 100% mortality when infected.
- High concentrations of domestic birds facilitate transmission.

PROTECTING BIRD HEALTH

- Keep domestic birds away from wild birds.
- Wear separate clothing and footwear inside and outside of bird housing.
- Dedicate one person for bird care and not other outdoor tasks.

Permit and Movement Control Permissions

The Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) is the lead for highly pathogenic AI and has declared several outbreaks and control zones. Birds, their products, by-products and other materials cannot be moved into, out of, within, or through primary control zones except by permission. NEW: MINISTER'S ORDER AND REGULATIONS UNDER THE ANIMAL HEALTH ACT, 2009

To reduce the spread in Ontario an Animal Health Control Area Order has been issued to temporarily prohibit any bird commingling events including sales, shows, races and auctions. This Minister's Order took effect September 23, 2022, and ends on November 21, 2022, but may be extended if required.




REMEMBRANCE DAY Left We Forget


At the meeting on July 4, the members decided to adopt the poppy as its "Flower of Remembrance," and that November, poppies were distributed in Canada for the first time.
